It seems Diran Yazejian (nick name, Darren) was all about cars from the start. At 16, he and his honey, Joyce, cruised Woodward in Detroit. It was while he was in the US Army, in Korea, that he was handed a magazine called DREAM CARS. It showed that a car's design began with an idea sketch that was followed by a realistic rendering with bright chrome and shiny paint. At that moment, he set a career goal.

After an honorable discharge and marriage to Joyce, they set out to California to attend Art Center School, (now Art Center College of Design) majoring in Transportation Design. Upon graduation, he was hired by Chrysler Corp. and went into the Chrysler-DeSoto Exterior Studio. In 1962, he transferred to Dodge where he remained for many years, the high point being on the design team that designed the '68 Charger.
